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Governor Releases Budget Proposals to 2023 Legislature



Gov. Tim Walz and Lt. Gov. Peggy Flanagan's biennial budget recommendations include nearly \$7 billion in education investments over the next four years. The \$65.2 billion FY 24-25 budget—an increase of \$13.1 billion over the current biennium—includes new spending, tax cuts, and tax increases.

Several of AMSD's legislative priorities are included in the Governor's budget recommendations including linking the education funding formula to inflation. The Governor proposes to increase the funding formula by 4 percent for next fiscal year and 2 percent in FY 25. The formula would be linked to inflation beginning in FY 26.

The Governor's proposed budget also addresses several additional AMSD priorities including:

- Reducing the special education cross-subsidy by 50 percent at a cost of \$722.6 million in FY 24-25, and \$840.1 million in FY 26-27;
- Reducing the English learner cross-subsidy by 25 percent at a cost of \$24.9 million in FY 24-25 and \$32.5 million in FY 26-27;
- Providing funding for school support personnel and funding for school linked mental health grants and intermediate school linked behavioral health grants;
- Providing more than \$30 million in funding to address the educator workforce shortages in both K-12 and early education, and to recruit and retain more educators of color;
- Fully funding the state's 4,000 Voluntary PreK slots permanently;
- Allowing school boards to renew an existing voter approved operating referendum.

The Governor's budget also proposes to fund breakfast and lunch for all students. This legislation is rapidly advancing through the Legislature. (<u>HF5/SF123</u>) The universal meals proposal comes at a cost of \$388.4 million in FY 23-25, and \$424.3M in FY 26-27.

The Governor's budget also creates a new cabinet-level Department of Children, Youth and Families. The new department would incorporate programs from several existing program areas including:

- Childcare and Early Learning
- DHS programs and economic support programs
- Some older youth programming

The department will operate with a budget of approximately \$3 billion. The proposal calls for a two-year transition with the new department beginning in 2024 and would involve a transfer of more than 60 MDE staff, as well as more than 100 Department of Health and Human Services staff.
